

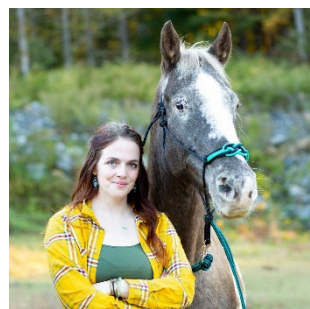

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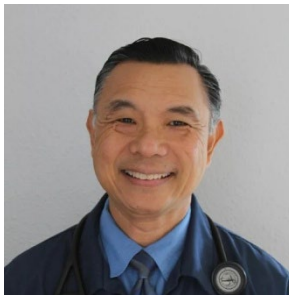
Briana Blackwelder, DVM

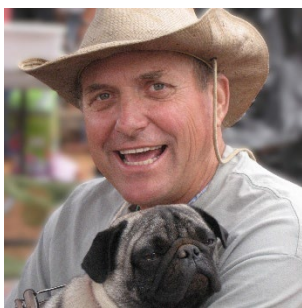
Natalie Cochrane BVetMed, DACVIM, CVA

Luke Martin, DVM

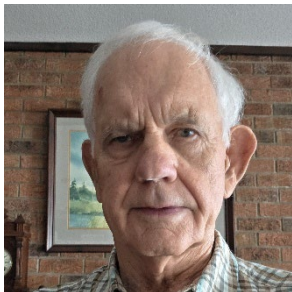

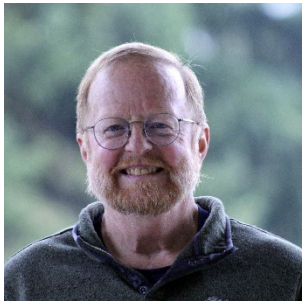
Shane Rootes, PhD

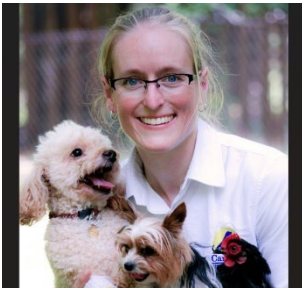
Bliss Steele
